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ACI supports certification – should be:

- Fair "level playing field"
- Consistent high safety standard everywhere
- •Reasonable emphasis on accident prevention and continuous improvement
- Cost of certificate not to exceed "real cost" of regulation
- Certificates should not have limited life



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- •Annex 14 Recommended Practices should not be equated to Standards and made mandatory by the certification process (they exist to provide guidance for design of new airports)
- •For Recommended Practices, there is a process for aeronautical studies to establish alternative provisions and operational procedures which could provide an equal level of safety
