Participants are also requested to wear the identification badge for all activities during the workshop and meeting.

5. Transfer Service

Participants should make their own transportation arrangement upon arrival in and departure from Bali, Indonesia. Most of the hotels run their transfer service to and from airport. Public transportation is easily accessible at the checkpoints and the hotels.

6. Passport and Visa Requirements

For entry into Indonesia, all visitors must hold a passport valid for at least 6 months from the date of entry into Indonesia, have at least 2 (two) blank pages available for stamps and have round-trip airplane ticket.

There are 3 (three) types of Visa for entering Indonesia:

- Visa in advance;

The NTSC (KNKT) will support any documents or every possible way for visa application, please inform us in advance.

- Visa on Arrival;

This visa can be obtained directly when you arrive at Ngurah Rai International Airport, Bali or other Indonesia international airports and seaports, regardless of the purpose of your visit (Business, Tourist, Social-Cultural).

Visa on Arrival is neither a work visa nor a visit visa. Therefore, it cannot be extended or converted into another immigration permit. The maximum stay permitted is thirty (30) days and could be extended (one time) for a maximum thirty (30) days. The fee for visa on arrival, payable upon landing, is US\$ 10 for 7 (seven) days visa and US\$ 25 for 30 (thirty) days visa.

7. Travel to Bali, Indonesia

Ngurah Rai International Airport, Bali (DPS/WADD), also known as Denpasar International Airport, operates 24 hours a day, provide direct flight to a number of destination city around the world. It normally takes 10 - 15 minutes from the airport to the workshop and meeting venue.

Please arrange with your hotel for transfer service to and from airport. Plenty of public transportations are available; you can choose a fixed-fare prepared taxi or taxi meter. For fixed-fare prepared taxi, just go to the ticketing booth, normally after the arrival gate

and buy a fixed-fare ticket. For taxi meter, you can find outside the airport gate. Better choice and most reliable taxi meter company is Bali Taxi, also known as Blue Bird Taxi.

When **departing from Bali**, you are subject to the airport departure tax **IDR 150,000** which can be paid in cash in **Indonesian Rupiah only**.

8 Currency, Credit Cards and Banking Services

8.1. The Indonesia Rupiah (IDR) is the official local currency. Most shops will convert US Dollar, or other currencies, to Indonesia Rupiah.

Use only an authorized money changers, a formal bank or ask your hotel for money exchange and always ask for a receipt. An authorized money changers commonly establishments advertise as *Pedagang Valuta Asing Berizin* or *PVA Berizin* (Indonesian for "Authorized Money Changer") with a green *PVA Berizin* shield where it can be seen by customers.

The charge commission is various rate depend on the changers policies, always ask first about their rate offered and charge commission. Avoid changing money in smaller currency exchange offices located within shops.

USD 1.00 is approximately IDR 9,500 – IDR 10,000. Small bills (\$10 or smaller) and coins are generally not changeable.

8.2. International credit cards such as American Express, Diners Club, Visa, Master, etc, are usually accepted at major hotels, shops and restaurants. You will need small change in the Indonesia Rupiah for local transport and others.

8.3. Most major commercial banks have branches in the main tourist centers. Banking hours are generally from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday to Friday.

There are many ATM (Automatic Teller Machines) all over the place, especially at shopping centers and bank branches. Most of them are connected to international banking networks. ATMs dispense Indonesia Rupiah (IDR) only, and it comes in either IDR 50,000 and IDR 100,000 notes

9. Time

The time in Bali, known as WITA or *Waktu Indonesia Tengah*, is 8 hours ahead of Coordinated Universal Time (UTC + 8).

10. Climate and Weather

Daytime temperatures are pleasant, varying between 20 – 33⁰ C (68 – 93⁰ F) year-round.

From December to March, the west monsoon can bring heavy showers and high humidity, but days are still often sunny with the rains starting in the late afternoon or evening and passing quickly. From June to September, the humidity is low and it can be quite cool in the evenings. At this time of the year there is hardly any rain in the lowland coastal areas.

Even when it is raining across most of Bali, you can often enjoy sunny, dry days on the Bukit Peninsula which receives far less rain than any other part of the island. On the other hand, in central Bali and in the mountains, you should not be surprised by cloudy skies and showers at any time of the year.

11. Tap water

Tap water in Bali is not drinkable, but bottled water is universally available. The most popular brand is “Aqua” and that name is often used generically for bottled water. Just be certain that the bottle has an intact plastic seal.

Tap water in hotels should not be used for drinking unless explicitly labeled as safe or drinkable.

12. Electricity

The power supply in Bali is 220 Volt AC 50 Hz and uses 2-column-pin plugs. Other electrical equipment type will need a plug adaptor.



13. Telephone Service

Pre-paid mobile phone sim card (GSM or CDMA) can be purchased in any stores all around Bali as well as public phones, as known as *wartel*.

The Indonesian country code is +62.

Bali has six telephone area codes, they are :

14. Other Information

14.1. Bali is internationally well known tourism attraction island. After several disturbances to the tourism aspect, Bali has grown far beautifully to welcome everyone who would like to enjoy the distinguish culture of Bali.

14.2. Bahasa is the official Indonesia language. Balinese is the predominant by local people and English is also widely spoken.

14.3. Bali etiquette tips:

- Don't use your left hand to touch or give. It is considered as 'unclean', left hand is traditionally perceived as the hand used to clean yourself in the toilet. So when shaking hands, offering a gift, handing or receiving something, eating, pointing or generally touching another person, it is considered proper etiquette to always use your right hand.

The exception is when you use both hands to hand something over to someone; this is considered a high compliment.

- Don't use your index finger to point or to beckon. Pointing toward someone with index fingers is considered rude, especially if the one you pointed at is near and can see what you are doing. Pointing with open palm is more polite than using index finger; however, pointing with thumb with other fingers folded is considered the most polite form.
- Don't touch people's heads. The head of another adult should never be touch, as it is commonly believed that the soul inhabits the head, and the head is therefore sacred
- Dress modestly before entering a temple in Bali. Temple guests are expected to wear shirts that cover shoulders and part of the upper arms. The waist and legs should be covered by a temple scarf, known as a *selendang*, and a sarong, known as *kain kamber*, respectively.
- Don't enter any temple if you're menstruating. This may be galling to any woman, but you have a whole island's culture against you on this one. Any woman on her period, or anyone with a running sore or bleeding wound for that matter, is considered impure and not to be allowed into any Balinese temple.
- Don't step on offerings, known as *canang sari*, in the street. Canang sari are offered to the Creator by locals first thing in the morning. Canang sari commonly packages of woven palm leaf, flowers and herbs.
- Don't smoke in public areas. A "smoke-free" by law has gone into effect across Bali as of 28 November 2011 - smoking is now forbidden in most public areas, including restaurants, hotels, temples, shopping center and tourist attractions.
- Always haggling in a Bali traditional market. Price negotiation is not considered impolite, but remembers to be pleasant about it. Smile and insist on the price you want to pay, and if you do not get that price, thank the merchant and walk away.
