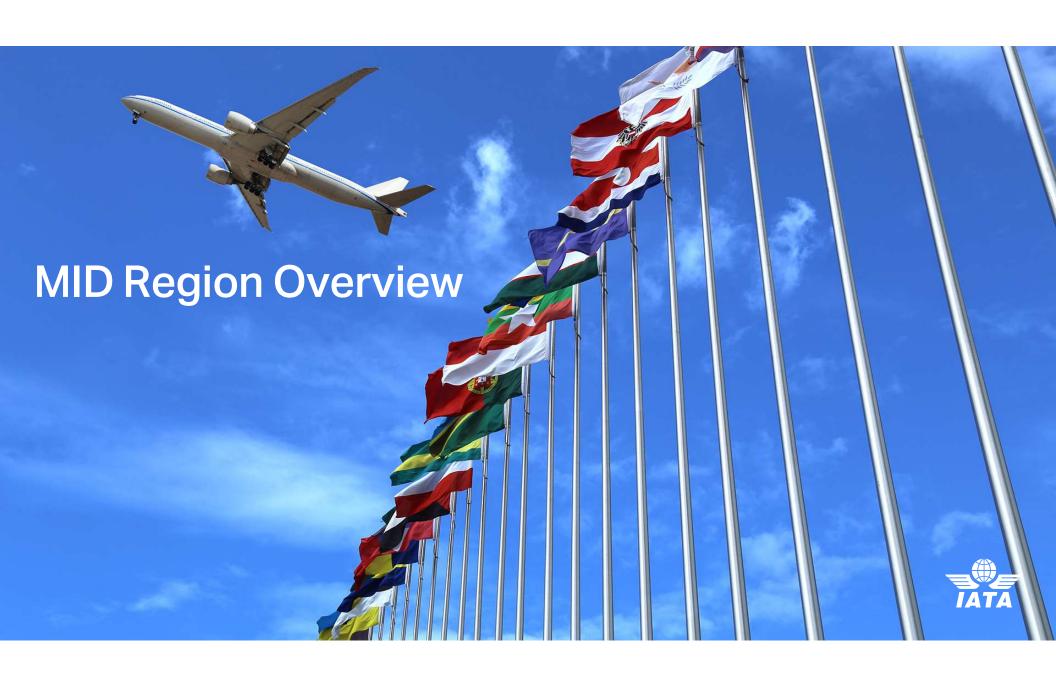

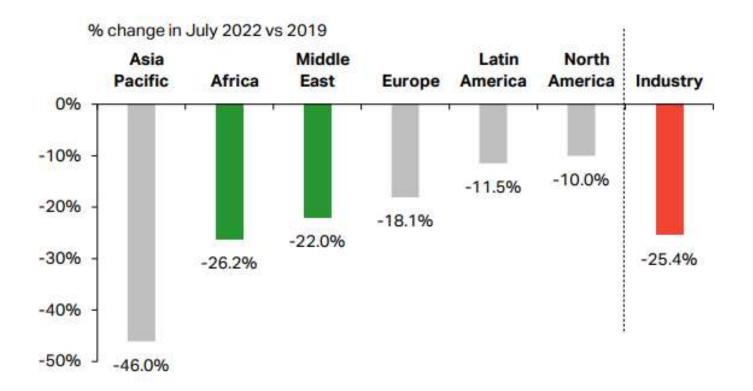

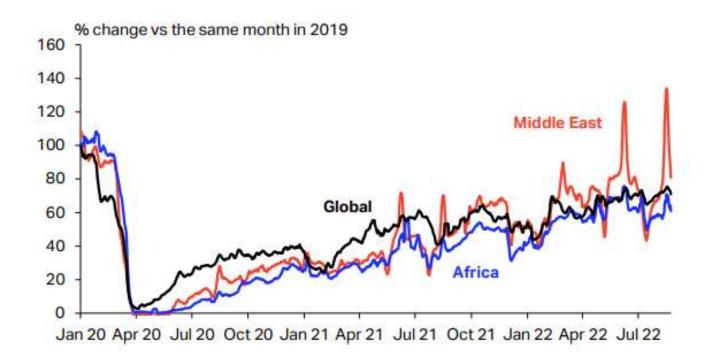


Growth in RPKs by region






Ticket bookings, by region (7 day moving average)





Aircraft deliveries in 2018-22

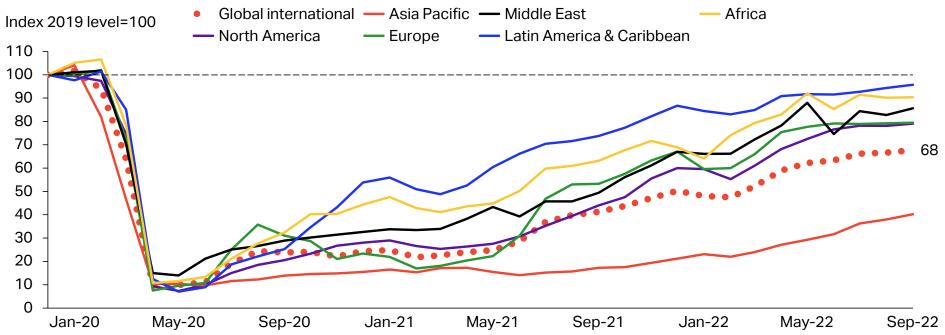

International air connectivity recovery by Sep 2022 varies significantly across regions

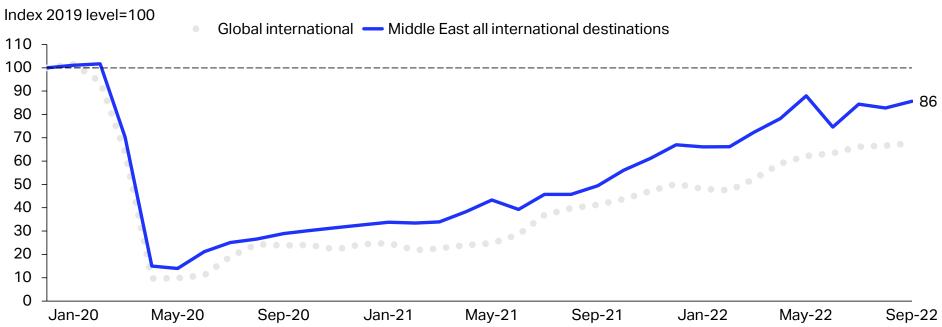
IATA International Air Connectivity Index by region for all international routes, monthly Jan 2020-Sep 2022

IATA International Air Connectivity Index, monthly Jan 2020-Sep 2022



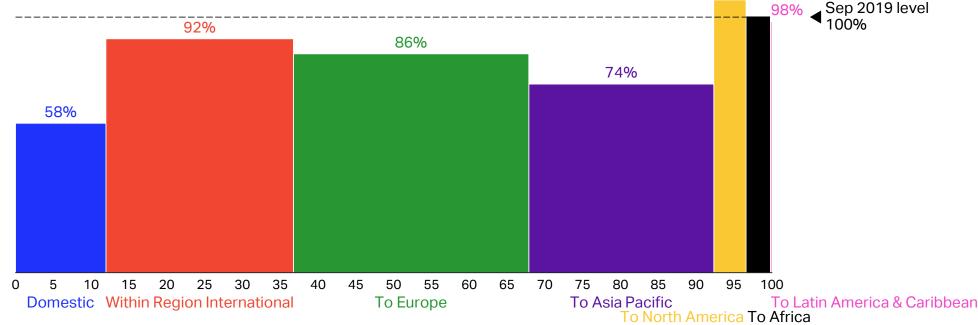


Extent of recovery to Sep 2019 connectivity for Middle East by Sep 2022

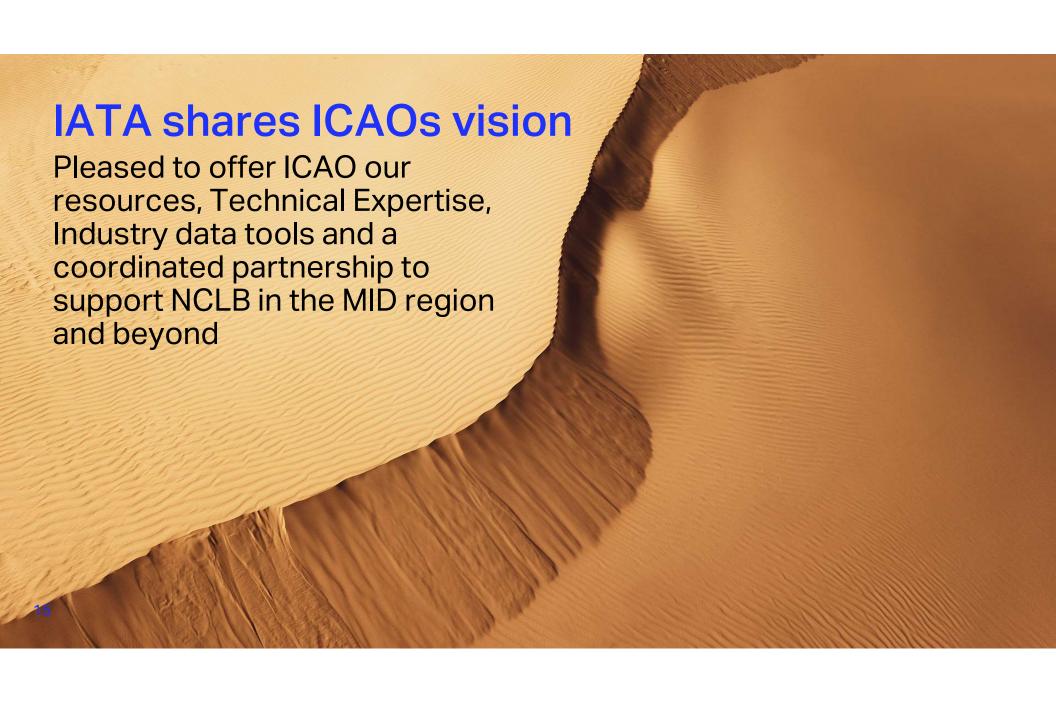

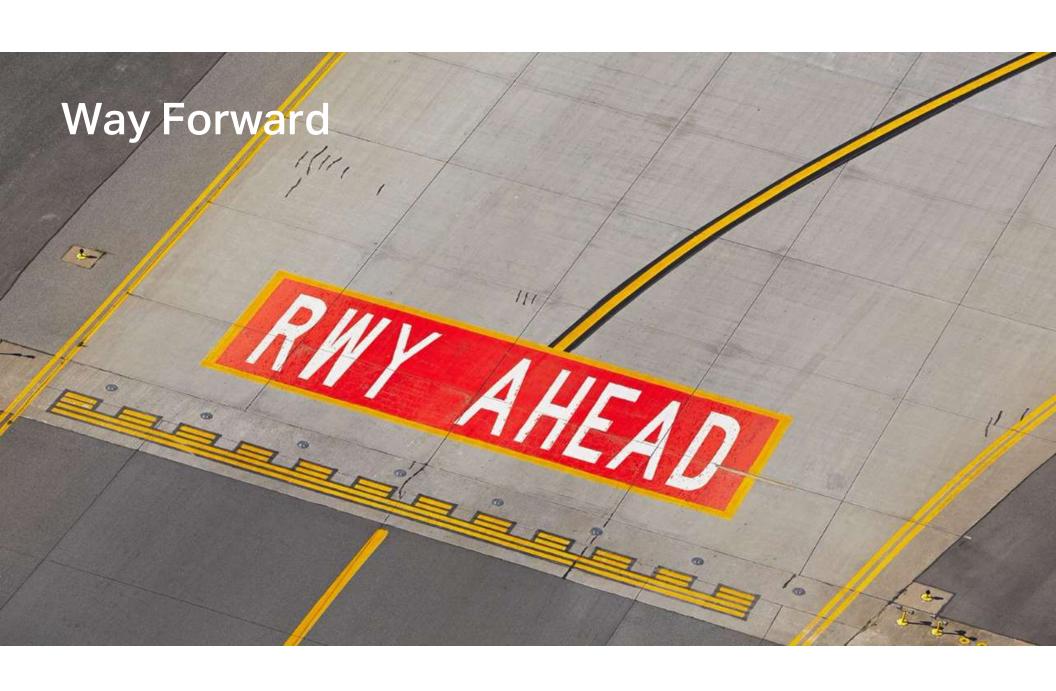

Proposed Next Steps
