Aviation Climatic Impact - Viable Answers to Growing Pressures

Abstract

Finding viable answers to the growing climatic impact of aviation CO_2 emissions is a major challenge facing ICAO today. This Colloquium provides an excellent opportunity to continue the dialogue with all industry partners concerned.

By identifying open emissions trading as the preferred longer-term solution, ICAO has signalled that viable answers require innovative thinking for finding cost-efficient solutions based on a long-term strategy. The industry supports this approach and urges ICAO to continue its work in this direction.

ICAO has also recognised the need for actions in the short term; these too should aim for sustainable solutions and true environmental benefits. To impose unnecessary financial burdens on the airline industry, to artificially curtail its economic output, or to introduce measures with inherently uncertain environmental outcomes, would clearly not fit the bill.

Voluntary initiatives to limit CO_2 emissions, on the other hand, do fit this bill, even when they are initially adopted on a small scale, i.e. on an individual carrier basis. Industry is clearly progressing and moving beyond traditional compliance strategies. ICAO is expected to lend full support and stimulate the use of voluntary initiatives.
