INTRODUCTION

1. History of the Meeting

1.1. The ICAO Asia and Pacific (APAC) Office hosted the Fifth Meeting of the ICAO APAC COVID-19 Contingency and Recovery Planning Group (ACCRPG/5) via web-conference from Bangkok, Thailand, on 7 August 2020.

2. Attendance

2.1. Over ninety-six (96) participants registered to attend the Meeting from twenty (20) Member States/Administrative Regions and eleven (11) International Organizations and aviation industry partners. The list of registered participants is at **Appendix A** to this Report.

3. Officers and Secretariat

3.1. Mr. Jim Wolfe, *Assistant Secretary, COVID International, Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, Australian Government*, and Mr. Conrad Clifford, *Regional Vice President, Asia Pacific, International Air Transport Association (IATA)*, presided as Co-Chairs of the Meeting.

3.2. Mr. Arun Mishra, *Regional Director, ICAO APAC Office*, acted as Secretary for the Meeting; assisted by members of the ICAO Secretariat.

4. Language and Documentation

4.1. The working language of the Meeting was English, inclusive of all documentation and this Report. The meeting considered seven (7) presentations as listed at **Appendix B** to this Report. The Meeting documentation is available at the ICAO APAC Office website (<https://www.icao.int/APAC/Meetings/Pages/2020-ACCRPG5.aspx>).

REPORT ON AGENDA ITEMS

1. Opening of the meeting and working arrangements

1.1. The Secretary officially opened the Meeting (web-conference) at 10:00 hrs. in Bangkok on 7 August 2020 (ICT, UTC+7). The Secretary and the Co-Chairs provided opening remarks and welcomed all participants to the Meeting.

Adoption of the Agenda

1.2. The Meeting adopted the Agenda as shown below:

Review the Report of the previous meeting

1.3. The Secretariat disseminated a copy of the Report from ACCRPG/4 to all members and focal points of the ACCRPG and posted the Report on the ICAO APAC Office website (<https://www.icao.int/APAC/Meetings/Pages/2020-ACCRPG4.aspx>).

2. Public Health and Aviation Authorities' Engagement/Collaboration

Presentation: *Australia's coordinated health and aviation response to COVID-19* (Australia)

2.1. Australia's national, cooperative approach is based on the following three basic principles:

- Coordinated governance – between Australia's Commonwealth, State and Territory governments;
- Evidence-based decision making – using the best available health-authority advice; and
- Working with aviation industry – to enhance effective implementation [of alleviation measures].

2.2. Australia's *Health Sector Emergency Response Plan for Novel Coronavirus* outlines how key activities will operate and how the public can support the COVID-19 response. The National Cabinet, as Australia's peak intergovernmental decision-making forum, coordinates the overall national response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

2.3. The Australian Health Protection Principle Committee (AHPPC), which also makes key decisions and coordinates Australia's national health response to the COVID-19 pandemic, supports the National Cabinet, which is also briefed by border control and transport departments amongst others to inform its decision making.

2.4. Through the provision of advice, guidance material and public information, the Australian Government and its agencies work with aviation industry to manage the health risks from COVID-19 on international flights and at international airports. Furthermore, all travellers currently

arriving in Australia must go into government approved mandatory quarantine for 14-days from arrival, with very limited exceptions including those for airline crew.

2.5. While Australia’s coordinated response has led to the easing of some COVID-19-related restrictions on domestic aviation travel, a recent resurgence in community transmission of COVID-19 in parts of Australia has negatively impacted on the domestic aviation industry. This resurgence also presents additional challenges for the resumption of international aviation services such as a trans-Tasman “COVID-19 safe travel zone” between Australia and New Zealand.

2.6. The possibility of recurring and/or long-term impacts of COVID-19 might necessitate a shift from temporary infrastructure or operating procedures changes for aircraft and airports to more permanent changes designed for a future with COVID-19.

Presentation: *Working with Public Health Authority to Revive Air Travel (Singapore)*

2.7. Singapore’s public health-related measures are decided by a collaborative, multi-Ministry, multi-agency task force, which takes into account the shared national objectives of reviving air travel, protecting jobs, preserving core capabilities and safeguarding public health.

2.8. The task force facilitates the Civil Aviation and Public Health Authorities, in collaboration with other health, transport and immigration agencies, to adopt a system-wide, risk-based and fact-based approach to decisions on aviation public health-related measures.

2.9. Singapore’s approach would facilitate revival of air travel between countries with comparable [COVID-19] infection situation by easing the requirement for quarantine, but maintaining other appropriate measures including testing.

2.10. A possible challenge associated with testing as an effective public health-related measure for air travel is how to manage the globally, potentially large (and growing) number of “recovered” passengers who are no longer infectious but still test positive [for COVID-19]. Some form of authoritative health documentation (e.g., “Discharge Letters”) might provide an acceptable solution [possible deliverable for the ACCRPG?].

Presentation: *Engagement/Collaboration mechanisms of Public Health and Aviation Authorities of Sri Lanka against COVID-19 Pandemic (Sri Lanka)*

2.11. Sri Lanka joined the Collaborative Arrangement for the Prevention and Management of Public Health Events in Civil Aviation (CAPSCA) in 2012 and believes CAPSCA is important in bridging the gap between the aviation and public health sectors.

2.12. In Sri Lanka, the Quarantine and Epidemiology Units of the Ministry of Health provide the National focal points for International Health Requirements (IHR), including those IHR implemented by airport and public health officials at international points of entry in Sri Lanka.

2.13. The Quarantine Unit of the Ministry of Health, in collaboration with the Civil Aviation Authority, developed the *National Public Health Contingency Plan for Designated Airports in Sri Lanka*, which involves all stakeholders at international points of entry in a collaborative effort to prevent spread of COVID-19.

2.14. Public health-related measures implemented at Sri Lanka’s airports include a “Health Declaration Form” for all arriving passengers and 14-days centre-based quarantine followed by 14-days

home-based quarantine. Sri Lankan officials also conduct community surveillance of arrived international passengers.

2.15. Sri Lanka established a special task force, including the Civil Aviation Authority, to develop a national “take off” document (based on the ICAO CART, CAPSCA, WHO and other related documents) on aviation public health-related measures during the COVID-19 pandemic. Sri Lanka’s Air Transport Facilitation Committee will involve all stakeholders related to aviation in finalizing Sri Lanka’s “take off” document.

2.16. Sri Lanka’s collaborative approach, involving Civil Aviation and Health Authorities, has enabled it to adopt aviation public health-related measures based on risk assessment, which not only prevent the spread of COVID-19 through air travel but also minimize disruption to airline crew and airport staff operations.

3. ACCRPG Sub-Group reports and Work Program

Presentation: *Public Health Sub-Group* (Public Health Sub-Group Rapporteur)

3.1. The PH/SG convened online for its 5th and 6th meetings on 23 July and 6 August, respectively. Only nine (9) APAC States had responded to the PH/SG’s checklist on implementation of the ICAO CART “take off” guidance. The PH/SG reminded the meeting that all States should submit responses to the checklist as applicable and as requested by ICAO State letter ref: SN 5/1 – AP154/20 (TC), dated 23 July 2020.

3.2. Crucial challenges/issues identified by the PH/SG include requirements for testing/quarantine of air travellers and the need for collaboration between aviation and public health officials. The PH/SG also reached out to States (via the above ICAO State letter) to identify the most pressing challenges/issues which potentially impede the implementation of the CART “take off” guidance.

3.3. Other matters which the PH/SG is considering include: the need for coordination between CAPSCA- and IHR-focal points, apparent ambiguity with respect to the applicability of personal protective equipment (PPE) used during flight, carriage on-board of [liquid] alcohol rub in excess of 100 ml. (also referred to the Safety Sub-Group), the wearing of [eye] goggles by pilots for the whole of flight and other issues related to Flight and Duty Time Limitations for Crew (also referred to the Safety Sub-Group).

Presentation: *Safety Sub-Group* (Safety Sub-Group Rapporteur)

3.4. The SAF/SG has conducted five (5) meetings as of 29 July 2020 to discuss ACCRPG’s assistance to DGCA’s on implementation of the Recommendations 1, 2 and 3 of the CART Report.

3.5. With respect to Recommendation 1, a slight increase from 83% to 85% of APAC States have updated the COVID-19 Contingency Related Differences (CCRDs) in the Electronic Filing of Differences (EFOD) subsystem.

3.6. With respect to Recommendation 3, the SAF/SG is considering various guidance materials under development or in use such as those related to implementing and monitoring alleviations and ramp inspection guidelines, the use and storage of hand sanitizer on-board aircraft, (and from Australia, bulletins on) the use of PPE while safely executing procedures impacting safety, applying SMS in high change environment when returning to operations, management of unruly passengers and return to line operations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

3.7. The SAF/SG discussed and prioritised seven (7) challenges and barriers to re-start and recovery [of international aviation].

Presentation: Security and Facilitation Sub-Group (Security and Facilitation Sub-Group Rapporteur)

3.8. The AVSEC-FAL/SG convened online for its 6th meeting on 29 July 2020. Sixteen (16) APAC States had responded to AVSEC-FAL/SG’s survey questionnaire on the establishment of a National Air Transport Facilitation Committee and the use of Passenger Health Locator Forms. The AVSEC-FAL/SG disseminated to States the ICAO *Guidelines for Aviation Security Contingency Measures during the COVID-19 Pandemic* and promoted the ICAO webinars on the above guidelines (on 6 August 2020) and the Implementation Packages (IPacks) – *Supporting States' Aviation Response, Recovery, and Resilience Efforts during COVID-19* (on 5 August 2020).

3.9. The AVSEC-FAL/SG identified the following major challenges/obstacles and opportunities:

- 1) Facilitation of “travel bubbles” / “public health corridors”;
- 2) Management of unruly passengers;
- 3) Need for collaboration between Civil Aviation and Health Authorities for decisions on measures to support aviation re-start/recovery; and
- 4) Harmonization of health declaration and contact tracing requirements and forms.

Meeting discussion

3.10. The meeting acknowledged the significant progress so far by each of the Sub-Groups on their respective work in several areas. The Co-Chairs encouraged the Sub-Groups to continue their work, especially with respect to impediments faced by States, including identification of three most challenging impediments, in restarting aviation services and developing relevant guidance for the restart within an agreed timeframe (as detailed at Appendix D to the ACCRPG/4 Report).

ACCRPG and Sub-Groups website

3.11. To facilitate the ACCRPG and Sub-Groups with sharing relevant documentation, the ICAO APAC Office established the following dedicated website:

4. APAC States’ progress on implementation of CART Recommendations

Presentation: Covid-19 Response and Recovery Implementation Centre (CRRIC) (Secretariat)

4.1. To date, only twenty-two (22) of the thirty-nine (39) APAC States had nominated a CRRIC Focal Point/s to ensure the accuracy and timeliness of each State’s information shared via the CRRIC.

4.2. ICAO reminded the meeting that the seventeen (17) APAC States which had not yet nominated a CRRIC Focal Point should do so as requested by ICAO State letter, ref.: SN 5/1- AP142/20 (RD), dated 7 July 2020.

4.3. The CRRIC Focal Points are primarily responsible for coordinating the input of information in the CRRIC, on behalf of their respective State, with all the relevant departments,

organisations, industry bodies, etc. To facilitate the population and editing of information in the CRRIC, ICAO enable the Focal Points to nominate additional assistants, as necessary.

4.4. The CRRIC provides Focal Points with tools to perform a self-assessment/gap analysis of their State’s adoption and implementation of the ICAO CART Recommendations and Guidance. Each Focal Point has the ability to continually update their State’s information, as necessary, to reflect the State’s situation with respect to the evolution of the COVID-19 pandemic and any changes to the CART Recommendations and Guidance.

4.5. The CRRIC provides users with a List of Focal Points as well as a Dashboard showing the level of implementation by States of the CART Recommendations. The CRRIC also provides States with the ability to share their appropriate documents via a “Best Practices” link.

4.6. To further assist the CRRIC Focal Points, ICAO organized an online *CRRIC Orientation Session* on 11 August 2020.

5. Any other Business

Economic Impact of COVID-19 on Civil Aviation and the Financial Alleviation Measures

5.1. ICAO organised a webinar on the *Economic Impact of COVID-19 on Civil Aviation and the Financial Alleviation Measures* on 13 August 2020 to support high-level decision makers in States dealing with economic regulation of air transport and States’ implementation of CART Recommendation 10.

6. Next Meeting

6.1. The Co-Chairs and Secretariat proposed that the Group reconvene online for its next meeting (ACCRPG/6) on 28 August 2020.
