## **Fourteenth Meeting of the Regional Aviation Safety Group – Asia and Pacific Regions (RASG-APAC/14)**

(Bangkok, Thailand, 28-29 November 2024)

### **Agenda Item 2: Updates from ICAO, APRAST and APAC-AIG outputs for RASG-APAC consideration and approval**

#### **UPDATES ON DGCA 59 – SAFETY ACTION ITEMS**

(Presented by the Secretariat)

##### **SUMMARY**

59<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Directors General of Civil Aviation of the Asia and Pacific Region was held in Cebu Island, Philippines from October 14-18, 2024. The Conference deliberated about 79 DPs in total of which 19 DPs were based on Agenda Item 3; Safety.

This WP presents a brief account of the twelve (12) Safety outcomes identified as Action Items based on 19 DPs and 17 IPs presented at the conference. Action by the Meeting is on Paragraph 3.0 below.

## **1. INTRODUCTION**

1.1 59<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Directors General of Civil Aviation of the Asia and Pacific Region was held in the vibrant island of Cebu on October 14-18, 2024. Theme for this year's conference, Shaping the Future of Aviation: Sustainable, Resilient, and Inclusive, is timely and relevant on both global and regional scales.

1.2 The Conference was attended by 350 participants, from 37 States/Administrations, 11 International Organizations and 8 national and 12 international sponsors/exhibitors and deliberated for four days in ten Agenda Items, inter-alia, Safety. There were 79 Discussion Papers presented, and 57 Information Papers submitted (136 Conference Papers in total) under 10 Agenda Items of the Conference. 1.3 Under the Safety Agenda Item there have been 19 Discussion Papers and 17 Information Papers generating about 12 Action Items for implementation by all stake holders.

## **2. DISCUSSION**

2.1 The Theme Topic of the 59<sup>th</sup> DGCA Conference was set as: “*Shaping the Future of Aviation: Sustainable, Resilient, and Inclusive*”.

2.2 A high-level Panel Discussion was held on the first day moderated by Mr. Thomas Tannhauser A. Fortun – Assistant Director General-II, Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines with the elite panel members invited by the top management from:

- a) Civil Aviation Authority of Singapore,
- b) Civil Aviation Administration of China,
- c) Federal Aviation Administration of the USA,
- d) Philippines Airlines,
- e) Japan Civil Aviation Bureau and
- f) Mactan-Cebu International Airport.

2.3 The Theme Topic was also discussed as Agenda Item 1, moderated by Dr. Vinolia Salesi, Director of Civil Aviation, Civil Aviation Division, Ministry of Infrastructure, Tonga.

2.4 Agenda Item 3 on Safety Enhancements was moderated by Capt. Victor Liu – Director General of Civil Aviation, Department of Civil Aviation, Hong Kong China. The Conference derived Forty-Nine (49) Action Items in total, out of which twelve (12) were on Safety.

2.5 The List of Action Items of the Conference is provided in **Appendix A** to this paper and the Action Items related to Safety Agenda Item are 59/2-59/13 which are underscored for review by the Meeting and urge States/Administrations to take follow action for the effective implementation of all of them.

2.6 The APRAST may also consider adopting applicable Action Items, if any, to amend their Work Programmes to support States/Administrations in the implementation.

2.7 Looking ahead, the DGCA/60 will be hosted by Japan in 2025 with the Theme Topic adopted by the 59<sup>th</sup> APAC DGCA Conference as “*The sustainable skies of the Asia-Pacific region: towards increased economic prosperity and social well-being by air transportation of people and goods in the Region*”. Accordingly, emphasis will be given to the theme topic in formulating discussion and information papers for DGCA/60.

2.8 States/Administrations are encouraged to submit discussion Papers identifying policy and high-level strategic matters related to safety issues to be brought to the attention of DGCA/60.
