UPDATES ON DGCA 59 – SAFETY ACTION ITEMS

(Presented by the CTA)

SUMMARY

Philippines hosted the 59th Conference of Directors General of Civil Aviation for the Asia and Pacific Region in Cebu Island from October 14 to 18, 2024. During the conference, a total of 79 Discussion Papers (DPs) were reviewed, including 19 Papers under Agenda on Safety in Item 3.

Based on the scope of COSCAP-SEA, this Working Paper (WP) provides a summary of the twelve (12) Safety outcomes identified as actionable items, presented during the conference.

The Meeting is invited to consider these actions as outlined below.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The 59th Conference of the Directors General of Civil Aviation of the Asia and Pacific Region was held in the island of Cebu on October 14-18, 2024. The theme for the conference was Shaping the Future of Aviation: Sustainable, Resilient, and Inclusive.
- 1.2 The Conference was attended by 350 participants, from 37 States/Administrations, 11 International Organizations and 8 national and 12 international sponsors/exhibitors and deliberated for four days in ten Agenda Items including Safety. There were 79 Discussion Papers presented, and 57 Information Papers submitted]All Discussion and Information Papers along with final report are available at website https://www.icao.int/APAC/Pages/2024-DGCA59.aspx.
- 1.3 Under the Safety Agenda Item there have been 19 Discussion Papers and 17 Information Papers producing about 12 Action Items for implementation by all stake holders.

2. DISCUSSION

- 2.1 Agenda Item 3 on Safety Enhancements was moderated by Capt. Victor Liu Director General of Civil Aviation, Department of Civil Aviation, Hong Kong China. The Conference derived Forty-Nine (49) Action Items in total, out of which twelve (12) were on Safety.
- 2.2 The List of relevant Action Items of the Conference is provided in **Appendix A** to this paper and the Action Items related to Safety Agenda Item are 59/2-59/13 which are highlighted for review by the Meeting and urge States/Administrations to take follow action for the effective implementation of all of them.

2.3 The meeting requested APRAST to consider adopting applicable Action Items, if any, to amend their Work Programmes to support States/Administrations in their implementation.
