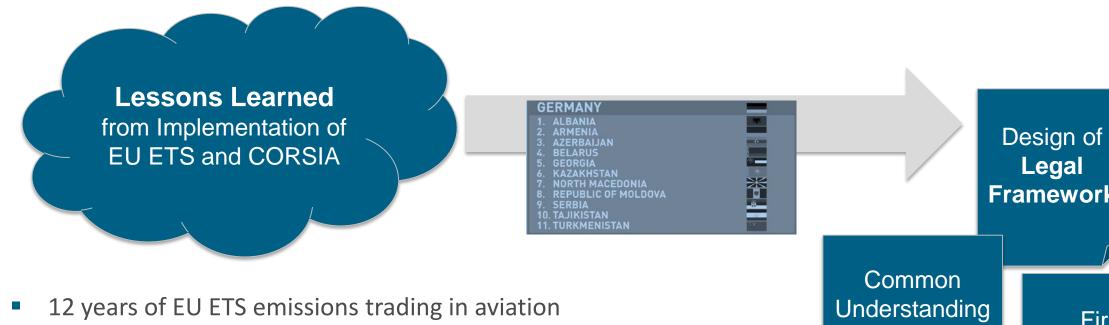

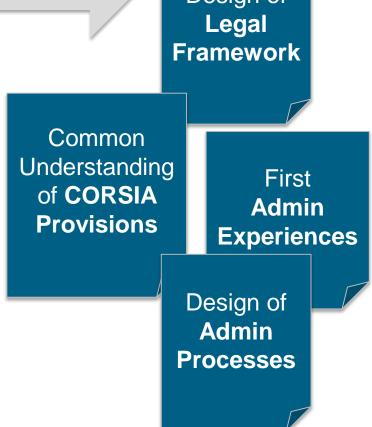

- 3 years of CORSIA
- Nearly 900 emissions reports reviewed
- Nearly 600 monitoring plans reviewed

Some Key Questions (I)

Human resources...

- Number of aviation experts in the team increased over time (expertise, technical knowledge, understanding)
- But: Strong support by legal experts, knowledge of administrative processes

Think in robust processes, but as simple as possible, examples...

- How to permanently store data (e.g. electronically vs. print-outs)?
- How to manage communication (e.g. secure, not secure)?
- How to further process data (e.g. in order to calculate the offsetting obligation)?
- Equal treatment and knowledge management (evolution from MS Excel files to software application)
- •
- → Also depends on the number of aeroplane operators to administer

Communication

- Online meetings with aeroplane operators
- Newsletter

Some Key Questions (II)

Exchange with regional and international experts...

- As simple as an Email list of three to four colleagues in the region
- Identification of best practice approach
- Pooling of resources, e.g. flight data basis for Order of Magnitude Check
- Outsourcing and Administrative Partnerships

Dare to complain to National Accreditation Bodies...

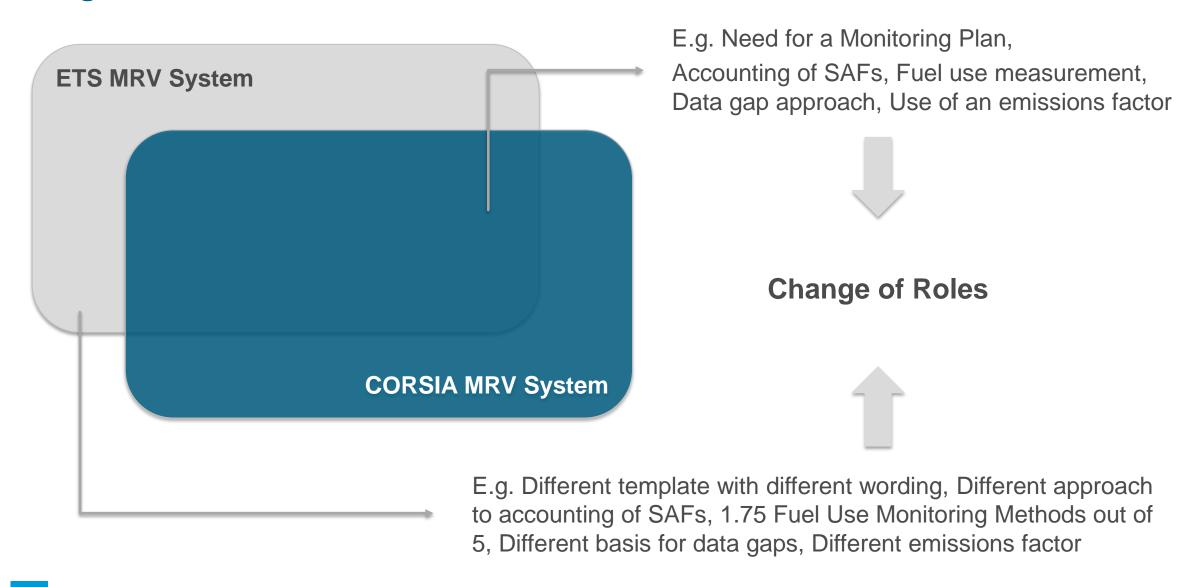
- The order of magnitude check provides the administering authority with an indication of the quality of the verification
- In order to aim for a continuous improvement approach, it is necessary to file an official complaint with the National Accreditation Body for specific verification bodies in cases of...
 - Weak quality of verification
 - Issue of impartiality and independence
- Same for foreign National Accreditation Body

Sharing of Experiences with Germany -> Future CORSIA MRV Provisions

CORSIA MRV: Lack of experience

- It is getting more and more challenging to provide good answers and solutions to raised questions given a lack of practical experiences with CORSIA MRV
 - E.g. Have your operators misread question xyz of the template as well?
 - E.g. Have you experienced any practical limitation of the fuel uplift fuel use monitoring method?
 - E.g. What do you do about the shift in deadlines from 2022 onwards to perform the order of magnitude check?
 - E.g. Why do our operators need to get their international flights verified twice (within the EEA)?

We are significantly profiting from the CORSIA MRV experiences shared amongst the group

- Given our lack of experience with CORSIA MRV, we need to listen carefully to the feedback provided to enable ourselves to further support the ICAO process of enhancing CORSIA provisions
- Feedback and discussions within the group help us to stay engaged and allow us to see the positive and negative aspects of CORSIA MRV provisions applied in practice
