



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The case for accommodation



Expert Level 6 exceed(s) the demands of aeronautical radiotelephony communications. Level 6 has a very wide coverage since it is intended to account for most first-language speakers with native or native-like proficiency as well as second- or foreign-language speakers with a high level of proficiency. Attainment of Level 6 should be considered as being beyond the realistic expectations of most second- or foreign-language learners.

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The case for accommodation



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Research also points to the need, especially for highly proficient speakers, to focus on skills of accommodation in speaking. Accommodation is a natural process of adapting speech habits to the constraints of the context and the perceived ability of the hearer to understand. This involves:

•The perception of an interlocutor's linguistic difficulties; and

•The replacement of high-risk (possibly unclear or ambiguous) features of the language to increase communicative efficiency.

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The case against idioms



(The) use of idioms may be taken into account in assessment procedures designed to identify Level 6 users in a non-radiotelephony context. This is not however intended to imply that idiomatic usages are a desirable feature of aeronautical radiotelephony communications. On the contrary, use of idioms is an obstacle to intelligibility and mutual understanding between non-expert users and should therefore be avoided by all users in this environment.
