



Last Frontier of Globalization

- 1 billion population
- 2nd fastest growing continent
- 6% GDP growth next Decade
- GDP of \$ 2.6 trillion by 2020
- 60% of world's uncultivated arable land



Challenges

 Involvement of too many mediators with conflicting interest (we can count up to 16 mediators including the airline to move shipment from a shipper to a consignee all affecting service and price)



A STAR ALLIANCE MEMBER *** Contnd...

- •Directional imbalance in Africa market
- •Very low Inter-Africa market
- •Lack of integrated multi-modal system for efficient transportation and interconnectivity
- •Political turmoil
- •Poor airport, road & ICT infrastructures and handling facilities



Challenges Contnd...

- High Operational charges, taxes and royalties
- Trade barriers between countries diminishing within Africa traffic.
- Longer bureaucracy and highly susceptible to inefficiency & corruption
- Persistently high fuel cost (50% cost element) 21% higher in Africa



Challenges Contnd...

•Africa is home to 12% of the world's population, but it accounts for less than 1% of the global air service market

- •Efficiency of sea freight and land transport
- •Significant professionalism, knowledge and experience gap



Conclusion

- Air Cargo Industry is not an easy business to make money to shareholders due to all the challenges stated above that put downward pressure on the yield but increasing cost
- Air Cargo is more than important in Africa as over 30% of the world's landlocked countries are found in Africa with poor connectivity
