Main challenge for Facilitation




More than 3.5 annual Million International passengers per year for whom border clearance need to be expedited





More than half of International tourists arrive by air



- Tourism expansion relies heavily on air transport.



ICAO and the United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy



- Counter-Terrorism Implementation Task Force (CTITF) established by the UN Secretary-General in 2005.
- Mandate: strengthen coordination and coherence of counter-terrorism efforts of the UN) system to avoid duplication of efforts, and improve accountability.
- CTITF consists of 38 international entities including CTED and ICAO, each of them contributing to the multilateral counter-terrorism efforts consistently with its own mandate.



Globally interoperable applications :

- INTERPOL SLTD
- Watch lists
- information sharing
- "Trusted" or "expedited" travellers

For the efficient and secure reading and verification of MRTDs (PKD, forensic travel Doc examination, etc..)



Credible evidence of identity, involving the tracing, linkage and verification of identity against breeder documents to ensure the authenticity of identity

Manufacture of standardized MRTDs, that comply with ICAO specifications (Doc 9303)

Processes for document issuance by appropriate authorities, and controls to prevent theft, tampering and loss







ePassport: Current status

Member States issuing ePassports

Asia and Pacific (APAC) :18 out of 39

Eastern and Southern African Office (ESAF) : 9 out of 24

European and North Atlantic (EUR/NAT) : 53 out of 56

Middle East (MID) : 7 out of 15

North American, Central American and Caribbean (NACC) : 4 out of 21


South American (SAM) : 8 out of 13

Western and Central African (WACAF) : 15 out of 24

- 125 Member States claim issuing chip-based passports
- Over 800 million ePassports in circulation
- The inspection of these documents lags far behind the issuance programs

ePassport Standard roadmap: status

 ICAO Secretariat WP to Air Transport Committee (ATC): <u>No Standard roadmap</u> until a proposal to be submitted in 2022 based on the challenges faced by States in ensuring that travel documents are issued on proper verification of identity.

• ATC decision:

a) The Secretariat, with the assistance of TAG/TRIP, will continue working with States issuing, or planning to issue, ePassports to ensure the implementation of robust identity management, including civil registry systems;

b) the final removal from circulation of non-Machine Readable Passports by certain States is planned to be achieved by 2022; and

c) in the meantime, the Air Transport Committee will consider the possibility of an ePassport Standard, following ad-hoc recommendations from the Facilitation Panel.

9.1 Programme and Coordination

- 44% of audited States have not established a National Air Transport Facilitation Programme based on the facilitation requirements of Annex 9.
- **49%** of the audits reveal States have not established a National Air Transport Facilitation Committee and/or Airport Facilitation Committees, or similar coordinating bodies.





9.2 Security of Travel Documents

- Over 95% of audited States are issuing MRPs in accordance with DOC 9303.
- Over **90%** of audited States :
 - incorporate security features in current travel documents;
 - have safeguards against theft of blank travel documents; and
 - establish appropriate controls over the entire travel document application, adjudication and issuance processes.





9.2 Security of Travel Documents

State's policies and processes to report information about stolen, lost, and revoked travel documents, issued by the State, to INTERPOL

- Approximately **80% of States audited** have:
 - established a policy to report to INTERPOL;
 - > designated an office or entity as responsible for reporting information;
 - developed guidelines for reporting information.
- Over 80% States audited have reported stolen, lost, and revoked travel documents to INTERPOL for inclusion in the SLTD database.





9.3 Inspection of Travel Documents

- Over 90% of audited States require appropriate measures and procedures to be established to assist aircraft operators in the evaluation of travel documents presented by passengers in order to detect fraud and abuse
- Only 68% of audited States ensure this requirement is implemented.
- Necessary precautions are taken by aircraft operators at the point of embarkation in 70% of audited States to ensure that persons are in possession of the documents prescribed by the States of transit and destination.
- Over **75% of audited States** are also ensuring that fraudulent, falsified or counterfeit travel documents are removed from circulation immediately and returned to the appropriate authorities of the State named as issuer.





9.4 Entry Procedures and Responsibilities

 Approximately 60% of audited States have not introduced an Advance Passenger Information (API) system under their national legislation
