# Overview

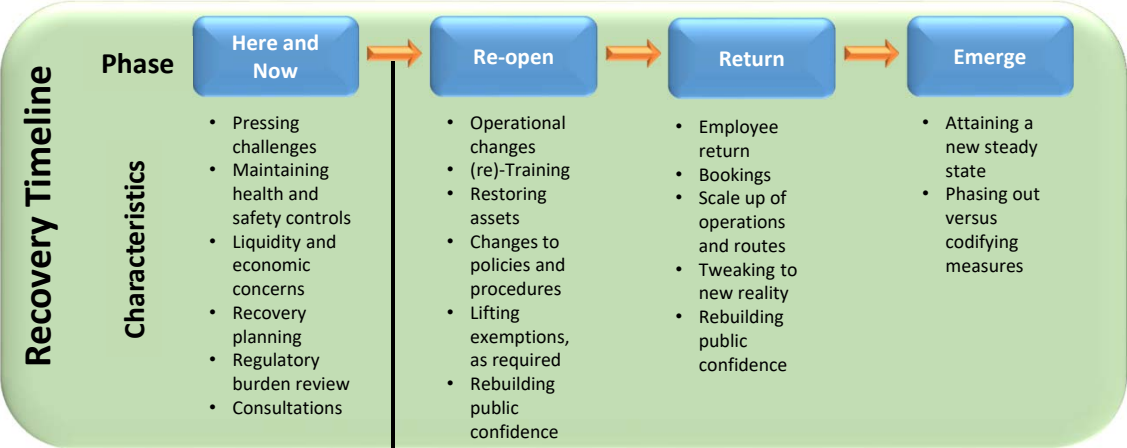
- The COVID-19 pandemic has created a global crisis that is having a significant impact on all aspects of the Canadian transportation industry, travellers and the economy.
- Unprecedented and sudden decreases in air passenger volumes have led to lost revenues for all aviation industry stakeholders. Recovery is expected to take far longer than in other industries.
- Immediate and long-term impacts on safety and biosafety have required the industry and Transport Canada (TC) to fundamentally rethink the entire air traveller journey.
- Immediately following the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, TC began working with industry and government partners to implement new safety and security measures.

# Air Travel Recovery Framework

- As an immediate first step, TC developed a “Recovery Framework” that outlined categories of measures, stages for recovery, and intervention touch-points within the travel trajectory.
- The “here and now” and “re-opening” stages of the Framework laid the ground work for identifying what immediate measures to implement to address public health concerns and reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 in the air travel sector.
- Canada is currently in the “Return” phase of the Framework where we are seeing increased flight volumes and are working to regain public confidence in the Canadian aviation system.

# Government of Canada Measures

- Transport Canada has issued Interim Orders which require air operators and passengers to adhere to the following provisions, among others:
  - Air operators must conduct a mandatory health check of passengers prior to boarding;
  - Air operators are required to deny boarding to any passenger that shows symptoms of COVID-19 or does not pass the mandatory health check;
  - Passengers must undergo temperature checks at the point of origin for inbound flights\*; and,
  - All passengers and crew members are required to wear a mask at all times during the boarding process, flight, and deplaning when they are two meters or less from another person.

\* Temperature checks will be required at the point of origin for outbound international and domestic flights.

# Government of Canada Guidance

- Transport Canada has also released guidance for the aviation industry:
  - The material includes guidance on managing ill passengers; cleaning and disinfection; and crew activities in flight.

- TC has also issued regulatory exemptions, safety bulletins, and alerts to industry in order to support operators throughout the pandemic.

# Working with Industry

- Throughout, Transport Canada has collaborated closely with industry to better understand how to support them in their response and recovery efforts.
- For example, TC has met frequently with major industry partners to take stock of the measures that have been put in place.
- From this exercise, we are confident that the Canadian aviation industry has extensive, multi-layered protections that align with ICAO CART Report recommendations.
