#### DANGEROUS GOODS TRAINING FOR FLIGHT OPERATIONS OFFICERS

(Presented by D. Brennan)

#### **SUMMARY**

This working paper proposes that flight operations officers be added to Table 1-4 as one of the categories of personnel that require dangerous goods training.

Action by the DGP-WG is in paragraph 2.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 At DGP/23 changes were adopted into Part 7;4.1.1 to require that operators make available to flight operations officers/flight dispatchers the information that is provided to the pilot-incommand about dangerous goods carried as cargo (NOTOC). The requirement for operators to implement this requirement becomes effective as of 1 January 2014.
- 1.2 The intention and objective of this change was to ensure that the flight operations officers have immediate access to the information on the NOTOC and could then provide this information to emergency response personnel in the event of an aircraft emergency.
- 1.3 The changes adopted at DGP/23 do not however specifically require that the flight operations officers receive dangerous goods training, and flight operations officers are not identified as one of the categories of personnel in Table 1-4 as requiring dangerous goods training.
- 1.4 It is believed that in the event of an emergency it is reasonable to expect that the flight operations officers will be required to understand the content of the NOTOC and may be asked to explain or interpret the information contained on the NOTOC.

1.5 It is therefore proposed that flight operations officers be added to Table 1-4. While it could be argued that flight operations officers should receive the same dangerous goods training as flight crew as they are required to assist the pilot-in-command in flight preparation and provide the relevant information, it is very unlikely that flight operations officers will ever see cargo or be expected to be able to detect undeclared dangerous goods. For this reason it is proposed to add flight operations officers as a separate column to Table 1-4.

## 2. **ACTION BY THE DGP-WG**

2.1 The DGP-WG is invited to consider amendment of Table 1-4 as shown in the appendix to this working paper.
